Dear George:
While going through Panama, I wrote this letterso that Geller could read and approve it.

According to our program in South America, I -finished everything except Venezuela, but as winter is coming soon, I left this work pending until Geller returns from Chile. Everything turned out perfectly: the organization of the meeting as well as gravity measurements. The only problem was the trip by railroad, as the train only stopped two or two and a half minutes at each station; therefore. I could only recover Lima, La Oroya and Huancayo. Later, I found out that there is a highway that runs parallel to the railroad and the work can be easily carried out by this route. MaybeI will make it this way when $I$ return using the military airplane for transportation to Lima. While the airplane goes to Chile and returns, there is time enough to make the circuit.The only possible problem could be that the vehicle should break down and therefore $I$ would miss the return flight of -the military plane and would have to purchase a commercial ticket to return to Panama. The costs would only be the perdiem for the driver, companion and gasoline. The vehicle could be loaned by the Inter American Geodetic Survey.

Referring to the Working Group Meeting in Panama, all persons with whom I talked accepted to attend it. Romanstated that December is a bad month to. hold a meeting; therefore, we decided that either October or November would be appropriate; all persons contacted agreed with these dates, except Dr. Ocola. who would like it to take place earlier. In-

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Bolivia I was unable to talk with Reynaldo, and therefore communicated with Father Cabre. We were both in accordance thatthe most capable person would be General Salvador del Pozo, who is working and has worked in Geophysics. I talked with him and he accepted to attend the meeting. Also, Roman Geller, the people in Brazil where I attended a meeting organized by the IAGS, all the agencies that work in gravity think that ca-mil Gemael De Curitiva, in south Brazil is one of the personsthat has worked more with gravity and should attend the meet-ing: so, if there is no inconvenience on your part, we could invite him, and the list would be the following:

Roman thinks that several persons in Central America could be invited besides Andrade. These could perhaps be Rudin.from Costa Rica, J. Bustamante from El Salvador and Granados from Honduras. Though there is much data in the other Central American countries, there are no gualified persons.

We could also invite Case from the United States, who has done much work in the northern part of South America and Dengo from Central America; a geologist who knows most of the problems of this region. Of course, they would cover their own expenses.

Geller thinks it would be convenient to invite Masin because he is one person who could present more work from Argentina.

Referring to the meeting, on which date could it beheld? How long will it last? Will the invitation be pre-sented by Kausel or you? I could have the invitations made in Spanish in Mexico, and then send them to Kausel or you for the corresponding signature and distribution.

In Panama we talked to Fassett of the IAGS, and heagreed that the meeting be held in the Canal Zone. Later we met Ing. Julio Monk, Director of the National Geographic Institute of Panama, and he also offered us the installa- tions of the Institute and the facilities of Panama. Roman will investigate if there is any problem in living in the Canal Zone and working in Panama. I do not think that theUS Panama agreement will allow this type of arrangement.

If the meeting is held in Panama, it would have totake place between October 15 th and November lst, or bet- ween November 9 and 27, because the period between November 1 and 9 is the Panamanian National Holiday period. Engr. Rafael de J. Icasa, Chief of the Department of Special studies of the National Geographic Institute of Panama wishesto attend the meeting and since there will not be any char-ges for him. I told him there would be no problem from ourpart.

I am enclosing a cost estimate for the meeting.
Mary will go with me to Venezuela, as she says she will not be without her trip to South America.

As there exists the possibility of a strike at the University, the mail that refers to the meeting should be sent to the PAIGH in Mexico City; there is not problem in receiving it from their part.
